Horse Health Tip:

Do you know how to tell when a horse is overweight or underweight? Professionals use a nine-point scoring system:

- **I-Poor/Extremely Emaciated:** Vertebrae, ribs, tailhead and pelvic bones are prominent. Bone structure of withers, shoulders, and neck easily noticeable. No fatty tissue to be felt. **2-Very Thin/Emaciated:** Slight fat covering over base of vertebrae. Loin area vertebrae feel rounded. Vertebrae, ribs, shoulders, and neck structures are faintly discernible.
- **3-Thin:** Fat is built up about halfway up vertebrae. Loin area vertebrae cannot be felt. Slight fat cover over ribs. Vertebrae and ribs are easily discernible. Tailhead is prominent, but individual vertebrae cannot be visually identified. Hip bones may be rounded but are easily discernible. Withers, shoulders, and neck are accentuated.
- **4-Moderately Thin:** Vertebral processes along back protrude above surrounding tissue. Faint outline of ribs is discernible. Fat can be felt around tailhead. Front-pointing hip bones are not discernible. Withers, shoulders, and neck are not obviously thin.
- **5-Moderate:** Back is level. Ribs cannot be visually distinguished but can be easily felt. Fat around tailhead may feel spongy. Withers appear rounded over vertebrae. Shoulders and neck blend smoothly into body.
- **6-Moderate to Fleshy:** May have slight crease down center of back. Fat over fibs feels spongy. Fat around tailhead feels soft. Fat begins to be deposited along the sides of the withers, behind the shoulders and along the sides of the neck.
- **7-Fleshy:** May have crease down back. Ribs can be felt, but with filling of fat between. Fat around tailhead is soft. Fat deposited along withers, behind shoulders, and along neck.
- **8-Fat:** Crease down back. Difficult to feel ribs. Fat around tailhead is very soft. Area along withers filled with fat. Area behind shoulder is flush with rest of body. Noticeable thickening of neck. Fat deposited along inner buttocks.
- **9-Extremely Fat:** Obvious crease down back. Patch fat over ribs. Bulging fat around tailhead, along withers, behind shoulders, and along neck Flank is flush with rest of the body.

It is dangerous for horses to be either very over or under weight, so keep an eye on your equine friends! Age and conformation will somewhat affect the scale system, but it is a good guideline. If you have any questions, call your vet!
