


GEORGE

VOLUNTEER NOTES -- Learning at SCHR: I've been volunteering at the Rescue for six months now and it's become the highlight of my week! Being in the presence of horses again has been so rewarding. My dad and I had horses and rode when I was young, and I had forgotten how much better life is with horses.

Each day at the Rescue has a cadence of chores and interactions that I look forward to: from seeing George's bright eyes in the morning to turning out the galloping geldings to pasture in the morning led by mighty Colton; from Dewey's silly bray when he goes into the hay shed (and knows he's not supposed to be there...) to that special moment when Raven trusts me enough to come over for love – and finally, at the end of the day, the peaceful scenes of 27 horses and two donkeys relaxed and happy.

Working with Diane has taught me so much, too. Her 46+ years of experience with this horse rescue shows every day – she knows these horses, their personalities, and their health concerns. In a short time, I've learned more than I ever knew about caring for horses.

But there's another aspect to the Rescue that I'm learning about, as well – the financial challenges. I know many other rescues work as brokers who "flip" horses to earn a profit. Here, every horse matters and many stay for life. And good care is expensive – especially now. I found out that donations in 2021 went toward: hay = \$3720/mo; bedding = \$360/mo; grain = \$768/mo; meds = \$305/mo; and that is just a small portion of the expenses.Whew!

As you might expect though, the results are priceless. To see a horse transform under the care of the Rescue is truly gratifying. Whether they are rehabilitated to find a new home or will call Spring Creek Horse Rescue their home for the rest of their lives, the motto of "We don't give up on them!" is clear and I'm so happy to be a part of it.
